#### Sports Week

A huge thanks to all the parents/carers/family members who were able to take the time to come in to school to support children with 'Sports Days' this week. The staff team have worked very hard to ensure pupils have had the opportunity to try a range of different sporting activities across the week and make sure children have had fun while keeping sun safe in extremely warm temperatures.

#### School Improvement Visit from Melrose learning Trust and Durham Diocese

Yesterday we had visitors in school from Melrose Learning Trust and Durham Diocese to assess the learning and progress of children as well as the quality of teaching and learning in school. Children in school were highly praised for their attitude and behaviour and engagement in teaching sessions. Both Nursery and Reception received numerous positive comments as did the maths teaching observed in KS1 and KS2. Staff were also praised for their ability to engage with pupils and plan an engaging curriculum. We are working hard to ensure that we can be the best we can be. We know there are areas to develop in school and we continue to make progress in these areas particularly attendance where we were recognised as a local school with above average attendance. Thank you for your support.

#### National Thank a Teacher Day

This week it was National Thank A Teacher Day so I would like to thank the Teachers in our community who are also parents / family members as well as the staff in school. Teaching is a fantastic but challenging job at times and It was lovely to receive an anonymous note from a group of parents thanking staff for supporting their children in school this year.

#### **Next Year**

Planning has already started in school for next year and we are looking at class sizes and the placement of staff. We will still be operating a Nursery and 2x classes in R - Y6. We are currently looking at the classes as there is the potential that some classes will be changed to better provide for the needs of the children. Transition day is week beginning 7th July for pupils in school. Y6 have a number of different transition days depending on their secondary school.

Additional Resourced Provision (ARP) - Communication and Interaction

I would like to share with Parents that the school is currently in discussions with the Local Authority to open in September a small 10 place provision for pupils with Communication and Interaction needs on site. We have identified this need within school but also within the local area and think we can provide the support that is needed to help support families who have pupils with this need. Once a formalised agreement is reached we will share more detailed plans about how the provision will work and be an asset to the staff, children and families at Prior's Mill.

Breakfast Club - Early Adopter Scheme We have been selected by the DFE to be one of the pilot schools for the free Breakfast Club Scheme being put in place by the new Labour Government. This will start after the Easter Holidays and last until the end of the summer term, we are currently working out what the implications are and will be getting in touch with parents soon to gauge interest in the scheme. The scheme will be open to all parents and it will provide free breakfast club provision from 8 -8:30am.

We have had a really positive first week - thank you for your patience as we have looked at ways of accommodating up to an additional 30 - 40 children on a morning in breakfast club.

The booking system is now open, If you want a space either paid or free please book on as it will help us understand staffing levels. We'll not be able to admit any pupils who are not booked in so please make use of the booking system. If you have any questions please ask the office.



#### Home Information Sheet - Aretha Franklin



About: Aretha Louise Franklin was an American singer, songwriter and pianist. Referred to as the "Queen of Soul", Rolling Stone twice named her as the greatest singer of all time in popular music. As a child, Franklin was noticed for her gospel singing at New Bethel Baptist Church in Detroit, Michigan, where her father C. L. Franklin was a minister. She went on to sell over 75 million records worldwide and received 18 Grammy Awards. From her time growing up in the home of a prominent African-American preacher to the end of her life, Franklin was immersed and involved in the struggle for civil rights and women's rights.

#### Attendance Matters



In accordance with School and Trust Policy any unauthorised absences (that are not subject to exceptional circumstances) will be subject to a fixed penalty notice.

#### Current School Attendance is 96% this is in line with the DFE target of 96%. FANTASTIC!!!




We strongly advise that any holiday in term time should be avoided due to the impact of lost learning time on children. Please be aware that leave of absence (holiday) during term time will not be authorised except in exceptional circumstances. It is school policy to refer any unauthorised absence due to holiday to the local authority who may issue a fixed penalty notice. This is a penalty of up to £120 per child, per parent and so can add up to a significant amount. The school does not receive any revenue from fines; the money is paid to the Local Authority. In addition, we now have a new system in school for pupils who are late. Pupils must be escorted to the office in the main building and a form completed by parents/carers to sign the pupils in

and indicate the reason for the lateness. This is for our records and also to avoid pupils becoming distressed.

# Worship Theme - Journeying as a Community All different, all equally valued Matthew 6:28-29



Find images of a wide variety of wild flowers. Jesus spoke about the flowers he saw in the field around him and how we can learn something from them. When we see the wild flowers, we see and marvel at the host of beautiful colours. We do not think to say, 'Oh, I see no yellow, I see no blue or pink, they are all the same!' We are jubilant because they are all so beautifully different, reminding us of our own uniqueness and ability to bring a smile to the face of those who love us. We celebrate differences in nature.

I wonder if we do that for people too? I wonder how you celebrate difference?

Imagine a conversation between the flowers in your pictures. The poppy might say to the rose, "Do your thorns prickle you?". The rose might ask the dandelion, "How do you do that thing with all the fluff?" The dandelion might enquire with the poppy, "How do you feel about your red petals representing something so sad?" etc This conversation would be about acknowledging difference and wanting to learn about it, from it and to celebrate it together. When we celebrate our differences as humans, we are showing how much we care about each other and how important it is to communicate with each other. Saying we cannot see difference would be like saying we can't see all the beautiful flowers. The whole meadow is made all the more beautiful by the variety.

Dear God, help us to remember that we are as different as the wild flowers in the fields. Even so, we belong together and we need each other but we are not all the same. Thank you for diversity in our school community, like a field of wildflowers making the landscape beautiful. **Amen.**

## Pupil involvement

Begin with a quick game: ask a volunteer to come to the front and mime or act out one thing animals need to be happy and healthy (e.g., eating, running, playing, resting). The rest of the group guesses the need. Complete a few rounds with different volunteers. Which needs are most important?

Ask the children if they, or anyone they know, have pets at home. What animals do they keep? How are they looked after and kept happy? Share experiences as a group.

Now, ask who has been to a zoo, safari park or aquarium before. What animals did they see? How are those animals cared for? How might this look different from caring for a pet at home?

What about animals living in the wild? What do they need to be happy and healthy, if no one is feeding or deaning up after them? Can we still care for wild animals? How? Talk about things like protecting habitats, not polluting, and respecting animals in nature.

**EMERGENCY HELP DURING THE WEEKEND / HOLIDAYS** 

During the weekend / holidays, whilst your children are playing outside with friends, we would

recommend that your child knows where to go to for help if they need it. This might be a

grandparent or family friend, as well as at home. It is important that your child knows how to

call the emergency services for help.

We have been advised that you talk to your child about risk-taking behaviour and the potential

consequences of any decisions that they make whilst away from home. Give your children the

confidence to say "no" to taking part in any risky or anti-social behaviour with their peers.

Of course, we want the children to enjoy the weekend and part of that is becoming more

independent from parents; however, we want all our children to return to school fit, well and

safe after the weekend.

TEWV Crisis team (CAMHS & Adults) has now changed.

There is a new system and people must call 111- option 2 - this is the 111 Mental Health line

& call handlers will transfer to the local crisis team appropriately.
